



Internship Information

mathleague.org invites applications for interns to join our contest staff starting in Fall 2018.

The internship is intended for recently-graduated students who are interested in more long-term involvement in math contests as writers, editors, coaches, and/or administrators. The internship is for one year, with the expectation of renewal for a second year pending satisfactory performance and availability of funding; a third year is also a possibility. This is a paid position. Application deadline is June 10th, 2018.

About Us

mathleague.org is the largest network of local and state math competitions at the elementary, middle, and high school levels in the United States.

We run over 200 contests and reach over 20,000 students each year. We offer a number of services focused on enhancing the quality and quantity of competitive mathematical opportunities available to students everywhere. Our philosophy includes a belief that math contests should be a learning experience; and to that end students should be exposed to brand new problems at every contest, should be allowed to keep their test questions and completed answer sheets, and should be given solutions to all problems at the conclusion of the contest. Eligibility

This internship is open to anyone who will be at least 18 years old and have graduated from high school by September 1, 2018. It is intended for those who have graduated in the last few years, but there is no upper age limit. Interns will be chosen on the basis of qualifications as well as potential long-term benefit to the intern.

Students who will be enrolled in grade 12 or below in fall 2018 are not eligible to apply. However, high school students are welcome to apply to join mathleague.org's writing staff for elementary and middle school contests.

The Experience

The internship experience will be tailored to each participant based on their career goals, the expertise of mathleague.org mentors, and mathleague.org's needs. We hope, however, to train interns in the following core competencies:

- Problem writing and editing
- Coaching
- Contest administration
- Policy development and higher-level administration



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- Customer service and public relations
- Teamwork, interpersonal skills, leadership, personal growth
- While each intern should expect to work to gain experience in all of these areas, we will work with participants to identify and develop specific areas of focus, which do not necessarily need to be among those listed.

Regardless of specific focus area, all interns will be expected to:

- Participate in writing and/or editing of contest questions, under supervision and mentorship of mathleague.orgs curriculum team.
- Administer at least one contest event per year. mathleague.org staff will assist with running contests until the intern is ready to do so on their own.
- Work at one major event per year (mathleague.org high school or elementary championships or ARML). Attend an in-person staff retreat each year in late summer or fall.

The expected time commitment is at least five hours per week, not including time spent at retreats or contests as mentioned in the previous section.

Compensation

Compensation will be discussed with each intern when an offer is made, depending on the interns specific job duties and plans. Pay structure may include salary, hourly pay, and/or per-problem pay (for writing only). This is not a benefits-eligible position.

All required travel expenses will be paid by mathleague.org.
